Soil CRC Participants Conference - Save the Date!

I am excited to announce that we are holding the 2023 Soil CRC Participants Conference in Launceston, Tasmania on 29-31 August. Following the success of the 2022 Conference held in Adelaide, we are keen to bring people together again this year to hear the latest research from the Soil CRC and to exchange knowledge and discuss collaboration opportunities.

The format will be slightly different this year, with the Thursday (31 August) being dedicated to field trips to look at soil management issues in northern Tasmania. Feedback from the Adelaide conference showed that many participants wanted to see more than just a conference room when they got together with the Soil CRC and that they would welcome the opportunity to get into the field and get their hands dirty. The tours will finish in time for participants to catch late afternoon flights and connections back home.

The Tuesday (29 August) will again feature the PhD Student Workshop and project team meetings and will finish with program meetings at the end of the day, before coming together for a welcome reception.

On the Wednesday (30 August), we will highlight the work of the Soil CRC through both presentations and panel discussions before celebrating with the Conference Dinner that night.

Staff news

It is with great sadness that I write to you about the health of Julie Moulton who stepped down from her position as Research Administration Officer in January to focus full time on her battle with cancer. Many of you will have had interactions with Julie around project agreements, variations and reporting over the past few years, and would have found her to be extremely helpful and engaging. She spent much of 2022 enduring chemotherapy and surgery but her condition has deteriorated as the cancer has spread. We wish her well in the coming months, and I have assured her that she will always be a treasured member of the Soil CRC family.

Staff appointments

Heather Apps commenced with us in October as a casual to help process the backlog of project agreements and variations and we have now appointed her to a 12 month part-time position as a Research Contracts Officer with the CRC to continue this important work. Heather is based at Armadale and works remotely, and is making a great contribution to the team.

Following Julie's resignation, we advertised for a full-time Research Administration Officer, and I am delighted to announce that Dr Lucy Weaver will be commencing with us on 3 April. Lucy is an organic chemist by training and has worked with CSIRO as a researcher, then with Swinburne University and NSW Health as a research manager. We are excited about the new skills that Lucy will bring to the Newcastle office.

I am also excited to announce the appointment of Olivia Louis as our new Communications Manager, commencing on 18 April. Olivia has a broad and diverse history in all areas of communications and has worked in recent years at Hunter Water and Newcastle City Council. Of great relevance to this role, she was the Communications Manager for the CRC for Irrigation Futures from 2005 until its windup in 2009.

We are also recruiting for a Soil Knowledge Broker and will be conducting interviews soon. This person will help to connect our farmer group members with the researchers and vice versa to help ensure that the knowledge being generated by the Soil CRC is accessible and relevant. This will contribute to the Soil CRC's increased focus on adoption in the coming years.

Board Meetings – University of Tasmania, Hobart

In the last week of February, the Board travelled to Tasmania and met at the University of Tasmania in Hobart. There was a presentation from the host university, UTas, and research summaries from Soil CRC project leaders from the University and from two PhD students. The Patron of the Soil CRC and National Soil Advocate, Penny Wensley, and her Senior Policy Office, Sue Bestow, also jointed the meeting in Hobart.

2023 Major Investment Round 6

The latest set of project proposals were received on 2 February and are now being reviewed and assessed by the Research and Adoption Committee (RAC), with input from the Commercialisation and Intellectual Property Advisory Committee (CIPAC) for those proposals with potential commercialisation opportunities. The Board will meet by video in late April to consider the recommendations of the RAC, and it anticipated that contracted projects will commence in August.

We received 7 proposals and in total, 20 of the Soil CRC participant organisations are listed as partners on these proposals. I would like to thank everyone for their effort and collaboration in putting these proposals together, especially the proposal leaders.

Commonwealth reporting

The FY22/23 Quarter 3 is soon ending. This will cover activities from 1 January to 31 March 2023. Please note the following due dates:

- Project Quarterly Reports (PQRs) close 10 April 2023.
- Non-Project In-kind Reports (NPIKs) close 20 April 2023.

As the closure occurs over the Easter break, you are encouraged to submit as early as possible. You can now include records for all activities that you have not reported in previous reports submitted throughout the years.

I encourage everyone to review and submit details of their involvement to the projects, as well as NPIK activity. For projects, participants should reach out to their project leaders now to discuss what needs to be done. Also, a reminder that IP Registers are an important part of projects and overall research integrity. We are looking closely at these, especially overdue ones. We may withhold payments until they are submitted and deemed as acceptable by the CRC. Collectively it is up to us all to look after the IP within projects, for the broader benefit of the CRC and its partners.

Invoicing

In some cases, we have received invoices for project payments ahead of time, where the milestone has not yet been delivered or approved. We will hold those invoices until project delivery has been progressed and the appropriate milestones achieved. We encourage project leaders and researchers to liaise with their finance and administration teams and let them know if there are any delays in projects.

Conversely, some participant organisations are behind in their invoicing on some projects. (i.e. we want to give you money, but can't do so until we receive an invoice!).
